Dear Member of the Class of 2023:

Congratulations on your selection to attend the National War College! We are an integral part of the nation's flagship platform for strategic-level joint professional military education, the National Defense University. Since its founding in 1946, the National War College's core mission has been to conduct a senior-level course in National Security Strategy. Throughout the academic year, we will put you in the shoes of national security decision-makers and focus relentlessly on helping you hone your strategy-making skills in preparation to wield the various instruments of national power. This is a rigorous program with weekly reading requirements augmented by a number of writing assignments. Upon completion, you will be prepared to serve at the most senior levels of our military and government and capable of dealing with the most challenging joint, interagency, and international environments. Our curriculum leads to a fully accredited Master of Science Degree in National Security Strategy. I encourage you to visit <http://nwc.ndu.edu/> to learn more about the program.

Our educational philosophy is centered on developing those critical thinking skills that lead to sound strategic analysis and synthesis. I want to underscore that we do not provide "school solutions." Our objective is to produce graduates who are exceptionally able to:

1. Critically analyze strategic problems and issues;
2. Communicate clearly and concisely;
3. Assess issues creatively and imaginatively;
4. Adapt to ambiguity and uncertainty;
5. Operate with a joint, interagency, and multi-national perspective; and,
6. Embrace an abiding structure of continuous learning about a dynamic and ever-changing global environment.

Our student body is unsurpassed in quality and represents the future leadership of our armed forces and government agencies. Historically, over one-third of National War College graduates have gone on to flag/general officer rank or the civilian equivalent in their careers. You and your classmates are national assets and among the finest officers and civil servants in the country.

The demographics of our student body include about 60% U.S. military officers, 25% federal government civilians, and 15% international fellows. Our non-DoD civilian students represent the State Department, the intelligence community, law enforcement, homeland security, and many other departments and agencies.

International Fellows will be among your classmates. They hail from more than 30 countries and participate as full members of your class. Historically, our international students are likewise extremely successful in their promotion rates to flag/general officer. Many

of our National War College international alumni have gone on to become Chiefs of Defense, Chiefs of Services, senior ranking officers, and ambassadors in their home countries. You will find that interaction with your international colleagues will significantly enhance your educational experience. If you are interested in serving as a co-sponsor for an international fellow, in tandem with our assigned faculty members, please let us know promptly. Co-sponsoring an international fellow can be an enriching experience for you and your entire family.

Our faculty will add another unique dimension to your educational experience. They are an outstanding group of civilian and military scholars. We have civilian academics, officers from all military services, State Department and USAID Foreign Service officers, and senior officials from DHS, FBI, CIA, NSA, DOT, NSA, and DIA. Combined, they give us a true joint and interagency perspective. In addition to strong academic credentials, the faculty brings a broad range of policy and leadership experience to the classroom. They have outstanding reputations for their excellence as teachers, practitioners, and mentors.

Your attendance in our 10-month program is an opportunity not only to enrich your mind but to improve your physical conditioning and general health as well. To that end, we offer a wide variety of physical training and exercise opportunities. You will also be afforded optional medical assessments offered by the Health and Fitness Department of the National Defense University. I encourage you to take full advantage of these services. More information will be provided during your orientation.

This academic year can also be a great time for your spouse and family. Enclosed is a short spouse's note from my bride regarding National War College spousal participation. Please ask your spouse to consider participating in the Spouses' Club. The size and scope of this program varies year to year and is determined by the level of interest. As you are all peers in class and come from diverse backgrounds, the spouse program is special. It can add a great deal to what should be a banner year for your entire family. Your spouse should also be aware that several of our academic elective courses are open to them, on a space available basis. And, there is a specific spouse elective called the National Security Strategy Elective, designed especially for all spouses. This course enjoys great reviews, and I encourage your spouse to consider joining it.

Finally, please mark your calendars for the National War College Class of 2023 Commandant's Formal Reception for you and your spouse on the evening of Friday, August 5, 2022. This will be the first of several social events held during the academic year. My bride and I, and the entire National War College family, look forward to welcoming you to the College and what will be a very special and enriching year.

Your initial success at NWC is contingent on being fully “in processed” into National Defense University (NDU) and NWC. You need to take an active role in this process and manage your specific entrance requirements. To this end, please read your National Defense University (NDU) welcome package and the information below closely. Many of your in-processing tasks must be personally coordinated between you and your parent Service/Agency. NDU’s public website is <https://www.ndu.edu>. Please familiarize yourself with the “Incoming Students” tab on that page. There, you will find the most up to date data for in-processing. Of note, our Information Technology and Security requirements are detailed there. The NDU campus is a Bring-Your-Own-Device personal computing environment, with a government-provided wireless network. As such, we have some unique Information Assurance requirements. Please follow the links on the NDU webpage to complete Information Assurance compliance requirements **prior** to your arrival on campus to ensure smooth in-processing and rapid connectivity. Government furnished computing equipment is very limited. Additionally, it is imperative that you arrive at NWC with a personal laptop computer. Tablets and phones can also be used to augment your learning, but some applications required a laptop.

Please complete this survey as soon as possible so that we can adequately prepare for your arrival. The website also includes a welcome letter from our Commandant and information about the NWC Spouses' Club.



Arrival/In-processing Instructions (CAO 14 MAR 22)

National War College (NWC) students report to Roosevelt Hall, Bldg. 61, in the Rotunda, no later than 0730 on 1 August 2022. On 1 August students will be welcomed to NWC and complete University-wide in-processing in the Atrium of Bldg. 62, Marshall Hall. More specific details will of the schedule will be released as they become available. For planning purposes, during the week of 1 August students should plan to be in session from 0830-1630 each day, Monday – Friday. Additionally, the NWC Commandant will host a formal reception on Friday, 5 August 2022. The uniform for the reception will be ASU or AGSU (Dress Variation) for USA; Service Dress for USAF and USCG; Service Dress White for USN; and Blue-White Dress "B" for the USMC. Appropriate civilian attire is a business suit for gentlemen and appropriate equivalent for ladies. Service-specific reporting instructions follow. Agency Chairs will provide additional guidance to civilian students if required.

Army: Report to Bldg. 61, Roosevelt Hall Rotunda for an Army Welcome/Introduction, 0800, Friday, 29 July 2022. Uniform is Class B short sleeve shirt with no tie. Contact NWC Army Service Chair, COL Allen Leth (719)505-6869 or email him at allen.d.leth.mil@ndu.edu at your earliest convenience but no later than before signing out of your losing command. Air Force (both military and civilian): The NDU Air Force Element will look to Friday, 29 July 2022 (time and location TBD) for on-boarding. Uniform is Class B short-sleeve shirt/business casual for civilians, and the agenda will conclude with pairings of students and faculty advisors and a tour of National War College. Navy: Muster with Navy Chair in Bldg. 61, Roosevelt Hall Rotunda on Friday, 30 July 2021 at 0830, uniform is Service Khaki. The USN Chair is CAPT Todd Glasser, (619) 871-3297, todd.s.glasser.mil@ndu.edu . In-process NDU IAW academic/in-processing dates above.

Coast Guard: Prior to arrival, Coast Guard students should contact the Coast Guard Service Chair, CAPT Jason Smith, USCG, (281) 796-9809, jason.s.smith.mil@ndu.edu and provide a valid email address and phone number to allow connectivity during travel/PCS to the National Defense University, Fort McNair, Washington D.C. In-process NDU IAW academic/in-processing dates above. CG-0923 will provide separate guidance for in-processing Coast Guard Base NCR. Base NCR provides administrative support for all Coast Guard members assigned within the NCR. Coast Guard students will receive further direction on time/date/location to meet with Coast Guard leadership. Tropical Blue Long is the uniform of the day, unless otherwise listed.

Marines: Report NLT 20 July 2022 to the Consolidated Administration Office (CONAD), HQ Bn (Henderson Hall) between 0730 - 1630. Phone contact for CONAD is (703) 614-7171/7172. Expect a National War College orientation for all Marine Corps students during the week of 25 July 2022 in Roosevelt Hall, Bldg. 61, Fort McNair. The uniform for the NWC orientation is Service “C.” HQMC intends to conduct a Top Level School brief (also known as the “Re-Green” brief) during the week of 25 July 2022 (time /location/uniform TBD). Complete remainder of NWC in-processing IAW all-hands academic/in-processing at the start of the academic year on 1 August 2022.

Official Travel

International travel is an essential part of the NWC Curriculum. All travel will be executed using Department of Defense orders published in the Defense Travel System (DTS). **All DOD students must ensure your traveler profile is released by your current organization in DTS before your departure from your last/parent organization before arriving to NWC.**

Each student must have a DOD Government Travel Credit Card for travel expenses.

International travel will be performed using an official passport (burgundy in color) or a diplomatic passport. If you hold an official passport it must have an expiration date after 30 November 2023. NWC will provide assistance in obtaining official passports for individuals who require them.

Immunizations

All students must provide proof of immunizations to be authorized to travel internationally. The following vaccinations are required: Hep A and B, Tetanus, Polio, MMR, and Varicella (chickenpox). Required vaccinations must be complete prior to attendance. Military students must depart current organization with a copy of their immunization records. Civilian students should send a copy of their immunization record to our Medical Liaisons: Mr. Don Myers, LPN, EMT at myersd5@ndu.edu and Mr. Duane Dunmire, ATC at dunmire@ndu.edu prior to arrival to NWC.
