- 4) Learn and practice the art of professional discussions, defending their ideas both orally and in writing.





# **Organization**

- Secretary Maintains meeting minutes of Board/Club meetings and handles all Club Correspondence.
- Treasurer Maintains financial records and carries out any required financial transactions.

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#### **Spouses' National Security Elective**



- Who: NDU Spouses / Significant Others / Adult Family members (Optional)
- What: NWC Spouses' National Security Elective (aka Spouses' Elective) now open campus wide to all NDU Spouses, including IF spouses.
- When: 12 Topics during the Fall Semester and 12 topics during the Spring Semester.
  Sessions are on Tuesdays (1200-1300), starting Tuesday, 12 September with
  Introduction to Strategy. There will be a few sessions that will run 90 minutes. There will be no classes over Thanksgiving and Winter breaks. Graduation will be on the last day of the course.
- Where/How Delivered: In Arnold Auditorium of Roosevelt Hall, National War College primarily by NWC Faculty
- **Why:** To provide spouses and adult family members the opportunity to learn about National Security, the National Security Enterprise and other topics similar to those their spouses are taking. Also a forum to meet other spouses and attend a progam on campus at NDU/NWC.
- **Topics include:** 1) Introduction to Strategy/Global Geopolitics 2) Some regional focus (China, Russia, Global South) 3) Some service and agencies making up the National Security Enterprise and 4) Other selected topics, e.g., Women in National Security, Civil War, US Constitution and Rule of Law.


